held rural telephone companies in Iowa, including La Porte City Telephone Company.

The FCC currently wants to change the Universal Service Fund and Intercarrier Compensation Program, which help to pay the costs of broadband service to rural areas. This puts approximately \$155 million in USF monies at risk which came to lowa in 2010. This funding help to off-set the high costs of building broadband and telephone networks in rural areas like La Porte City and Mt. Auburn, keeping your telephone and Internet services affordable.

"Increased rates for broadband service could be in the offing, although it's tough to forecast until the final rules are set," said James Robertson, president of the La Porte City Telephone Co. "It's more expensive to service at those bit rates those rural areas where people are scattered about," he said. The fund is essential because rural customers have as much need for broadband service as their urban counterparts, Robertson said.

"In fact, many customers have even greater need for it," he said. We are asking you to take action by contacting our legislators and letting them know about your opposition to any plans that would undercut Internet access in our communities.

Jim Jensson Celebrates 40 Years of Service

For over 40 years, Jim Jensson has been more than an employee, but the heart and soul of the telephone company. Jim started as a full time employee in August 1971 after working part-time the summer before that. "Back then my job consisted of climbing poles and building pole lines. Just about



all of the telephone lines were aerial when we first started. We had lead and paper cable versus copper and fiber optic underground cables like we install today," described Jim.



In Jim's opinion, the birth of the Internet and cell phones has made the greatest impact on telecommunications technology over the years. "When I started, some circuits had 10 people on a party line. People would put their phone on a tin pie plate so they could hear it vibrate and pick up the line to hear the neighbors' conversations. Today people are using cell phones. Now my daily work is often focused on DSL and locating underground cables." Tried

and true to his landline roots, Jim still won't carry a cell phone. It stays in his truck and is used when needed for work.

His co-workers describe Jim as the "guts" of the company. Dave Powell, LPC Tel Co's manager, has worked with Jim for 30 years and said, "Jim knows where every line, cable, and pedestal is without needing a map. He's one of those guys that keeps to himself, but he's a soft-hearted and giving member of our team."

Outside of the telephone company, Jim has been involved with the community in many ways including the La Porte City

Fire Department, the Sportsman Club, and served on the La Porte City Council. When asked if he's noticed a change in the communities of La Porte City and Mt. Auburn he said, "Much stayed the same – both are friendly little towns."
